Fauna Foundation: First GFAS Accredited Sanctuary in Canada

“Fauna is unique in that it not only provides a safe haven for the chimpanzees and monkeys in its care who were rescued from research, but for other animals in need as well,” **says Patty Finch, Executive Director, GFAS**

(Montréal, QC) – The Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries (GFAS), the premier organization providing standards for identifying legitimate animal sanctuaries worldwide, announced today that Fauna Foundation Sanctuary in Carignan, Quebec became the first sanctuary in Canada to receive GFAS Accreditation. The accreditation signifies that Fauna implements clear and respected international standards, covering not only humane care of the animals, but also the sustainability of the organization, its finances, staffing, education outreach, security and safety and other operational aspects.

“GFAS is proud to bestow Accreditation status on the Fauna Foundation Sanctuary,” says Patty Finch, Executive Director of GFAS. “ Fauna is unique in that it not only provides a safe haven for the chimpanzees and monkeys in its care who were rescued from research, but for other animals in need as well. As first to receive GFAS accreditation, we trust Fauna will serve as a model for sanctuaries throughout Canada. Fauna has worked hard to establish exceptional standards of animal care, housing and enrichment for chimpanzees and other residents. We have every expectation that Fauna will continue to accomplish great things on behalf of animals.”

Established in 1997, the Fauna Foundation has built a magnificent 200 acre sanctuary in which 12 chimpanzees and dozens of animals from monkeys to horses, goats, chickens, pigs, and others live in safety and in the company of their own species. Resident primates have access to spacious yet controlled environments where they can play, eat, socialize, communicate and sleep as they wish. Key to Fauna’s success is its ability to rehabilitate animals who have suffered from years of abuse or neglect. Fauna founder and director, Gloria Grow, is recognized as a leading expert on the trauma and recovery of chimpanzees rescued from research. She has co-authored papers on the topic published in major peer reviewed psychology journals. In addition to direct animal care and general supervision of sanctuary operations, Ms. Grow lectures both in Canada

and throughout the US and world on the plight of chimpanzees from research. She serves as co-chair of Project R&R: Release and Restitution for Chimpanzees in U.S. Laboratories, a campaign of NEAVS, Boston Ma which spearheaded national US efforts to end the use of chimpanzees in research. Fauna Sanctuary has played a key role in moving these efforts forward including Fauna's Tom, who died in 2009, serving as the chimpanzee ambassador for the campaign. Fauna's philosophy includes not only a commitment to the direct care of its residents, but also collaborative work with other organizations to end the causes of animal use, abuse and neglect which make sanctuaries necessary in the first place.

Says Grow, "Working as we do to provide exceptional standards of care for all of our residents makes our acknowledgment in this accreditation particularly rewarding." To be recognized by a global organization that assesses sanctuaries worldwide is further affirmation that we are accomplishing what we set out to accomplish. We are making a true difference for everyone who calls Fauna home."
